GAMMA -- FACILITATES meetings with its own members. While not meant as a replacement for therapy, many find that the wide variety of experiences shared in the group setting are as helpful as individual counseling.

GAMMA -- ADVOCATES no political or social agenda and is not a coming-out group although many do so. Each attendee is encouraged to find his own unique path.

GAMMA -- NETWORKS the member into a potential new group of friends.

GAMMA -- IS NOT a dating service.

GAMMA -- IS NOT a therapy group.

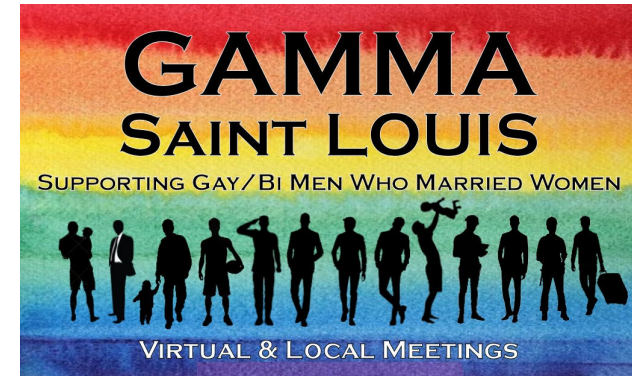

Bob:

I found out about GAMMA through a counselor I was seeing around ten years ago. It took me several meetings before a "truer" me started to emerge out of the confusion I was dealing with.

Finally, I was able to say to myself: "Yes, I AM gay."

I separated from my family, then about six months later, I came out to my 13 year-old daughter and then to everyone else.

Things were a bit rocky at first, but over the last seven to eight years my relationship with my wife has become very stable, and we are closer living apart than we ever were living under the same roof.

GAMMA helped me find a way to become honest with myself, and that helped me become honest with others.

Jerry:

I knew I was "different" from as early as I can remember. Being different was both good and challenging. I eventually married a wonderful woman and we had two wonderful daughters. I realized in my late forties that I had to tell my wife the truth about who I was and still am -- a gay man.

We decided to remain married and several years ago I was able to tell my entire family about who I am.

I am still married. It is not easy for me or my wife, but the truth is powerful and rewarding.

GAMMA has been helpful to me in many ways. GAMMA is a source of friendships and a place where gay men like me can safely relate their stories.

Ralph:

As I was growing-up on a mid-western farm, I knew that I had an interest in boys more-so than for girls. I dated in high school and some while in university, and never thought of myself as being "gay."

Nevertheless, before I got married, I began experimenting with contact with other men, but still didn't think of myself as being "gay."

At 32 I got married and my attraction to men seemed to

wane for several years. After about four years I realized that something was missing from my life and it was the closeness of another man. As I was exploring how to meet other gay men, while still being married, I discovered the existence of a support group named the "Gay Married Men's Association" (GAMMA). Almost immediately, I called the local GAMMA hotline and then attended my first GAMMA meeting within a week.

Prior to learning about GAMMA, I thought I must be the only married, gay man.

However, attending GAMMA meetings and hearing other guys tell their stories helped me understand that I am not alone. Talking with other guys who are in the same situation helped me develop the courage and "right words" to use in eventually telling my wife that I'm gay.

When I finally told my wife and later my children that "I am gay," it was not easy, at all, but I do think that I was better prepared and more confident because of my GAMMA experiences.
